Protecting Your Family In The Information Age

The following is a summary of some of the key points:

- Make your passwords more complicated by using at least eight letters with upper and lower case, number and symbols.
- Consider using a password management software like LastPass, Dashlane, or Keeper. I use LastPass to store my passwords.
- Check your credit report annually at <u>www.annualcreditscore.com</u>. You will not need to pay a fee. If you have children, consider checking their reports too since criminals are going for younger individual identities that could go unnoticed for years.
- Send confidential information such as Social Security numbers only via an encrypted email or fax instead.
- Contemplate a credit freeze if you do not anticipate needing any debt. You need to unfreeze it to obtain loans.
- Reduce your mail and credit offers at the website provided from <u>www.dmachoice.org</u> and <u>www.optoutprescreen.com</u> as I did years ago which reduced my junk mail and credit card offers substantially.
- Please call my office to request a distribution from your investment accounts. For your protection, I cannot accept requests via email or voicemail.
